The Visual Atlas Project

- Specifically, the project aims to:
 - Develop an online, interactive visual database of co-operatives, here called the Visual Atlas of Australian Co-operatives, that charts their development both over space and time in a visual and highly interactive way
 - Fill major gaps in the existing literature on co-operatives in Australia by undertaking detailed case studies of co-operatives
 - Develop a theoretical framework based on the atlas/database that attempts to explain the growth, decline and revival of co-operatives in Australia since their first appearance in the 1820s


The Visual Atlas Project

- Long term and deep time research on why co-operatives form, grow, decline and die
- Covers all co-operatives including co-operative federations and co-operative auxiliaries (Women's Cooperative Guilds)
- Range of data sources including Trove and UK Co-operative Wholesale Society records
- Accompanied by case studies
- A central, open-data platform of co-operatives
- Inspired by the National Atlas of Productive Ageing/Quinlan
- Data Visualisation Software: Back end: Tableau (licensed software); Front end: Public Visualisation interface (called Tableau Public)
- Main data in the Visual Atlas include location, date of operation, type of co-operative, membership, employment and finances
- Can provide other information such as the average life of co-operatives and trends in mutualisation/demutulialisation
- Multi-disciplinary project
- Australian Research Council funding until end of 2019 but resources being made available to continue beyond that date.



- 1,510 co-ops currently in database
- 543 agricultural co-operatives including 38 fishing co-ops and 9 irrigation co-ops
- 354 consumer co-operatives + 7 consumer wholesale co-operatives
- 271 financial co-operatives
- 56 retailer co-operatives
- 35 worker co-operatives + 20 producer co-operatives
- 13 housing co-operatives
- 1 platform co-operative


The Development of Australian Co-ops




Differing State Patterns - WA




Differing State Patterns - SA




Co-operatives Entered



Average Life Span of Co-operatives




Australian Demutualisation Over Time

Amalgamations and demutualisation

- Amalgamations
 - 1927 (dairying), 1981 (building societies), 1985-1986 (credit unions), 1987-1993 (dairying), since 1997 largely credit unions
- Demutualisation
 - 1857 (goldmining), 1923-1926 (Co-operative Legislation NSW), 1979-1982, 1986-1988, 1992-1995, 1998-2000, 2002-2017 (peak year – 2012)

Other features

- Co-operatives among small business
 - US example is ACE Hardware and New Zealand example is Foodstuffs
 - Form of collective bargaining by small business
 - Newsagents, butchers, hairdressers, publicans
- Indigenous Co-operatives
 - From the 1940s encouraged in recent times by federal government to form corporations
- Wide range of co-operatives (transport, energy, retail, agriculture, community)
